Local artists David Boekelheide and Christina Conant have proposed a concept for a public art installation along the Fanno Creek Regional Trail as part of the new construction at the SW 86th Avenue Pump Station Project. Environmental Services is funding the public art through the City of Portland's Percent for Art ordinance administered by the Regional Arts & Culture Council (RACC). The goals for the public art at this site are to communicate the ideas of journey and environmental stewardship.

The artwork is proposed to be installed later this year in the greenway area of a section of the Fanno Creek Regional Trail adjacent to the new pump station. Environmental Services, RACC, and the Tualatin Hills Park & Recreation District invite you to meet the artists and discuss their vision at the proposed location.
