Community Engagement Input Session August 6, 2012

Background: On August 6, 2012, Mayor Adams and Commissioner Fritz co-hosted an input session designed to provide community participants with an opportunity to provide input into the City's State and Federal Legislative Agendas. Community members' comments were captured during the meeting on flip charts. Those comments are transcribed below. All participants were asked to identify their top three issues after the input session was completed to get a general sense of the group's priorities at this session. This list reflects the group's prioritized issues, in descending order that were voted on by meeting participants.
