



Heritage Trees of Portland

BLACK WALNUT (*Juglans nigra*) JUGLANDACEAE

- Native to eastern North America.
- Can exceed 160'. Largest in U.S. on Sauvie Island 130' high with spread of 140'.
- Leaves compound with 13-27 leaflets.
- Nuts tasty but hard to crack and extract the meat.
- Wood is extremely valuable.
- Fall foliage is yellow.
- Common in Portland. Many planted >100 years ago.
- #35 was planted in the late 19th century on the Jacob Kamm estate, 13 acres bordered by SW Salmon, SW Jefferson, SW 14th and SW 18th. The Kamm house was moved in 1950 to SW 20th and Jefferson to make way for Lincoln High School.
