In accordance with Section IX of the PCCEP Plan, PCCEP hereby reports to the Mayor, PPB, DOJ, and the public at large the following quarterly report: This report will include information for Q2, from July, 2021- September 30, 2021.

II. Recommendations

- **Request for Data Transparency**

Jul 20, 2021 Dear Mayor Wheeler, Chief of Police Lovell, and City Auditor Hull-Caballero, We, the undersigned leadership of the Portland Committee on Community Engaged Policing (PCCEP), the Citizen Review Committee (CRC) and the Training Advisory Council (TAC), believe that further transparency in the internal reporting and disciplinary processes of the Portland Police Bureau (PPB), the Police Review Board and the Independent Police Review will help the community both better understand the accountability structure present in our public safety system and the limitations of said structure. To that end, we would like to request that all Force Data Collection Reports (FDCR) be made publicly available on a city website on an ongoing basis. We know that this can be accomplished since such FDCRs were made publicly available in their redacted form regarding policing of crowd control events last summer. This would be beneficial to the public in that it would improve transparency around police use of force, and beneficial to the PPB in that it would help the public better understand the factors involved in the decision by police to at times use force. Given that all FDCRs are reviewed by the PPB, we believe preparing these records for public release can easily be integrated into existing reporting processes. Furthermore, we would like to request that the City regularly publish on a public dashboard the number



of police discipline cases that were investigated, the outcomes of those cases, including the type of discipline meted out, and the time from incident until the finding. This data can be provided in the aggregate so questions of privacy should not be an issue. The City has recently provided such data to PCCEP for the crowd control events last summer. This would be beneficial to the public in that it would improve transparency, and beneficial to the PPB in that it would help increase a public sense that police are held accountable for their actions, increasing public trust in the PPB. Thank you for your attention to this matter. We look forward to meeting with you to discuss this proposal.

IV. Team Building and Training

Team Building



- There have been no team-building activities in this quarter. PCCEP members have expressed a desire to hold team building activities but scheduling remains an issue because there are already many meetings for each volunteer each month.

Training

- In the previous quarter, trainings were provided to new members. As a follow-up, new PCCEP members have been provided Q&A sessions with staff to increase onboarding relevancy and effectiveness.

V. Filled Vacancies Timely

- *Elliott Young, co-chair of the PCCEP resigned during Q3. Although PCCEP staff have focused on outreach to community members to apply to be PCCEP members, they have been unsuccessful in recruiting applicants. This will remain a focus for staff.*

VI. PCCEP CHALLENGES.

Maintaining Adequate Pool of Qualified, Diverse Alternates

- The PCCEP attempted to appoint an alternate who had been to the required trainings to fill the open seat. Unfortunately, the applicant no longer had the time to dedicate to the committee and left their place as an alternate. This will remain a focus in the next quarter in order to comply with the guidelines of the PCCEP Plan.

PCCEP Website

- The navigation of the PCCEP website remains difficult in the midst of the citywide website migration.

Workload

- PCCEP members continue to cite a large workload that is not in-line with volunteer committee status. The PCCEP volunteers consistently invest many hours a month dedicated to this work as do subcommittee members.

Covid-19 Restrictions

- The PCCEP remains unable to conduct in-person outreach due to the ongoing pandemic. The PCCEP continues to meet exclusively via zoom for all general and subcommittee meetings.



Officer Input and Meeting Attendance

- Rank and File Officers in the PPB have continued to attend PCCEP subcommittee meetings more regularly in Q3 2021; particularly the Behavioral Health Subcommittee, the Racial Equity Subcommittee, and the Settlement Agreement and Policy Subcommittee.

Mayoral Liaison

- The Mayor's Office has experienced high turnover. This has made it difficult to achieve consistency in the role of PCCEP Liaison. In September of Q3, Stephanie Lourenco stepped in as the Liaison for the PCCEP and has attended most public meetings. Sam Diaz in the Mayor's Office (who has never been in the role of PCCEP Liaison) has been the most consistent presence at PCCEP meetings from the Mayors Office and continues to work in collaboration with PCCEP members and staff.
