

Modernizing the Columbia River Treaty: Tribal and City Efforts

The Columbia River Treaty between the U.S. and Canada governs the development and operation of dams for power and flood control on the Columbia River. However, the 46 year-old policy does not include consideration of river health, needs of fish, or tribal fishing rights and cultural resources protected under other laws.
