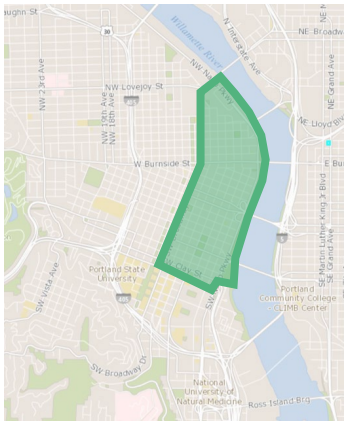


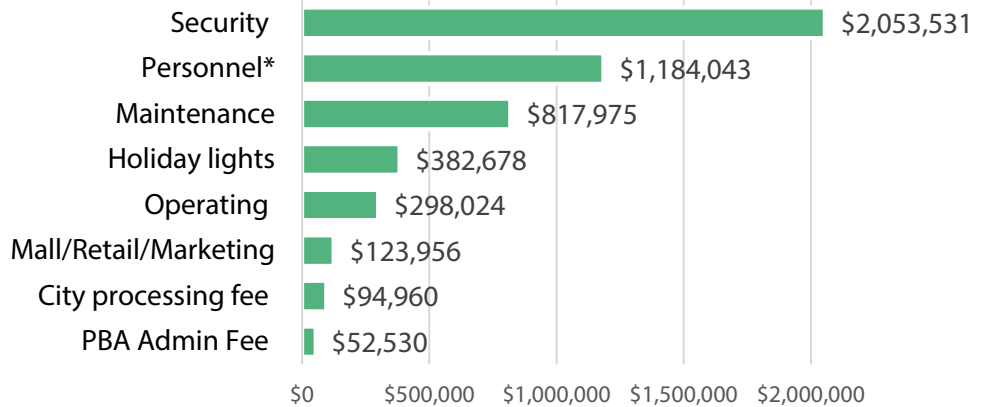
Clean & Safe Enhanced Services District

Formed in 1988 – renewal in September 2021

Budget



\$5 million budget in 2019



*Budget includes government relations, downtown service, sidewalk ambassadors, communications and admin. Community court funding ended in 2019.

Services in public spaces

- Portland police officers (4 FTE)
- Armed and unarmed private security officers
- Street maintenance, such as sidewalk clean up
- Graffiti removal
- One staff person for district attorney office, and until 2019 funded the westside community court

Board of Directors and Membership

- Property owners, property managers, or representatives of the downtown businesses are eligible to be board members and district members.

Contracting relationships and flow of funds

City of Portland collects fees from property owners and distributes revenue to district.

Clean & Safe district (Board of Directors) contracts with associations for management services.

Portland Business Alliance contracts with and manages service providers.

Service providers:

- Security officers and social services outreach
- Portland police officers
- Street maintenance and garbage removal
- Graffiti removal
- Business and economic development
- Government relations and advocacy
- Marketing and retail assistance
- District Attorney's office staff
- Community court
