Native Plant Mini-Grant

Stormwater runoff can reduce water quality in rivers and streams. Portland uses green streets, ecoroofs, trees and other green infrastructure to increase sewer system efficiency, and protect water quality, public health, and the environment. Green infrastructure keeps stormwater out of the sewer system, filters pollutants, provides habitat and increases neighborhood green space for healthier watersheds.

Native Plant Mini-Grants

Community Watershed Stewardship Program (CWSP) mini-grants provide gift certificates for native plants to community groups or individuals to help start or maintain projects beneficial to the local watershed.

We accept and review applications for mini-grants at any time but prefer you plant during the wet season, October through April. The limit is one mini-grant per group per year. Private landowners are further limited to a lifetime total of two mini-grants.

These stewardship projects must bring together volunteers for an overall goal of enhancing water quality in Portland's watersheds.

Eligibility

All project sites **must** be located within the City of Portland to be eligible.

COMMUNITY GROUPS

Community groups (public and private non-profits) are eligible for maximum mini-grants of \$500. Projects must meet these criteria:

- ✓ Be volunteer oriented
- ✓ Use plantings native to the Willamette Valley
- ✓ Provide community benefit
- ✓ Have high visibility
- ✓ Projects that take the place of required mitigation or penalty payments are not eligible for funding

PRIVATE LANDOWNERS

Private landowners are eligible for maximum mini-grants of \$50. Preference will be given to first time applicants.

Projects must meet these criteria:

- ✓ Plantings native to the area
- ✓ Project is already making progress (invasive removal, volunteering with local nature groups)
- ✓ Project is on streamside property or a completed stormwater project
- ✓ Plants are part of a larger restoration process
- ✓ Projects that take the place of required mitigation or penalty payments are not eligible for funding
- ✓ Project has a commitment to education or naturescaping

NATIVE PLANTS

are raised in the local environment and are adapted to local conditions. Native plants attract birds, butterflies, and beneficial species, provide habitat for wildlife, and help keep our rivers and streams healthy.
