


What is a brownfield?

A **brownfield** is a property where past use may have contaminated soil or water. Brownfields are found in cities, small towns, rural areas, commercial and industrial areas, neighborhoods, and along waterways.



910 acres of land in Portland are potential brownfields.* Of those acres:




Why redevelop brownfields?




About the program

Since 1998, Portland's Brownfield Program has provided environmental investigations on more than 65 properties totaling over 80 acres and contributed to the development of:


