



# What is stormwater runoff?

# Portland receives an average of 37 inches of rain a year.

**IN A NATURAL ENVIRONMENT**, soil and plants absorb rain. However, when streets, buildings, and parking lots cover the ground, rain can wash over the hard surfaces to create stormwater runoff. When runoff is not managed properly, it can:

- Carry dirt, oil and other pollutants to rivers and streams.
- Cause erosion and flooding.
- Harm property and wildlife habitat.
- Reduce capacity of sewer pipes to carry sanitary sewage, causing backups into streets and basements.

## What is Portland doing?

In addition to pipes, Portland uses green infrastructure like green street planters, rain gardens, trees, and restored floodplains and wetlands to collect runoff, keep it out of the sewer system, and filter it before allowing it to slowly soak into the ground. Green infrastructure also beautifies neighborhoods, helps cool the air, and provides habitat for birds, bees, and other wildlife.

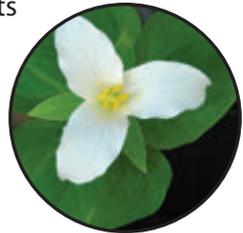


## What can you do?
