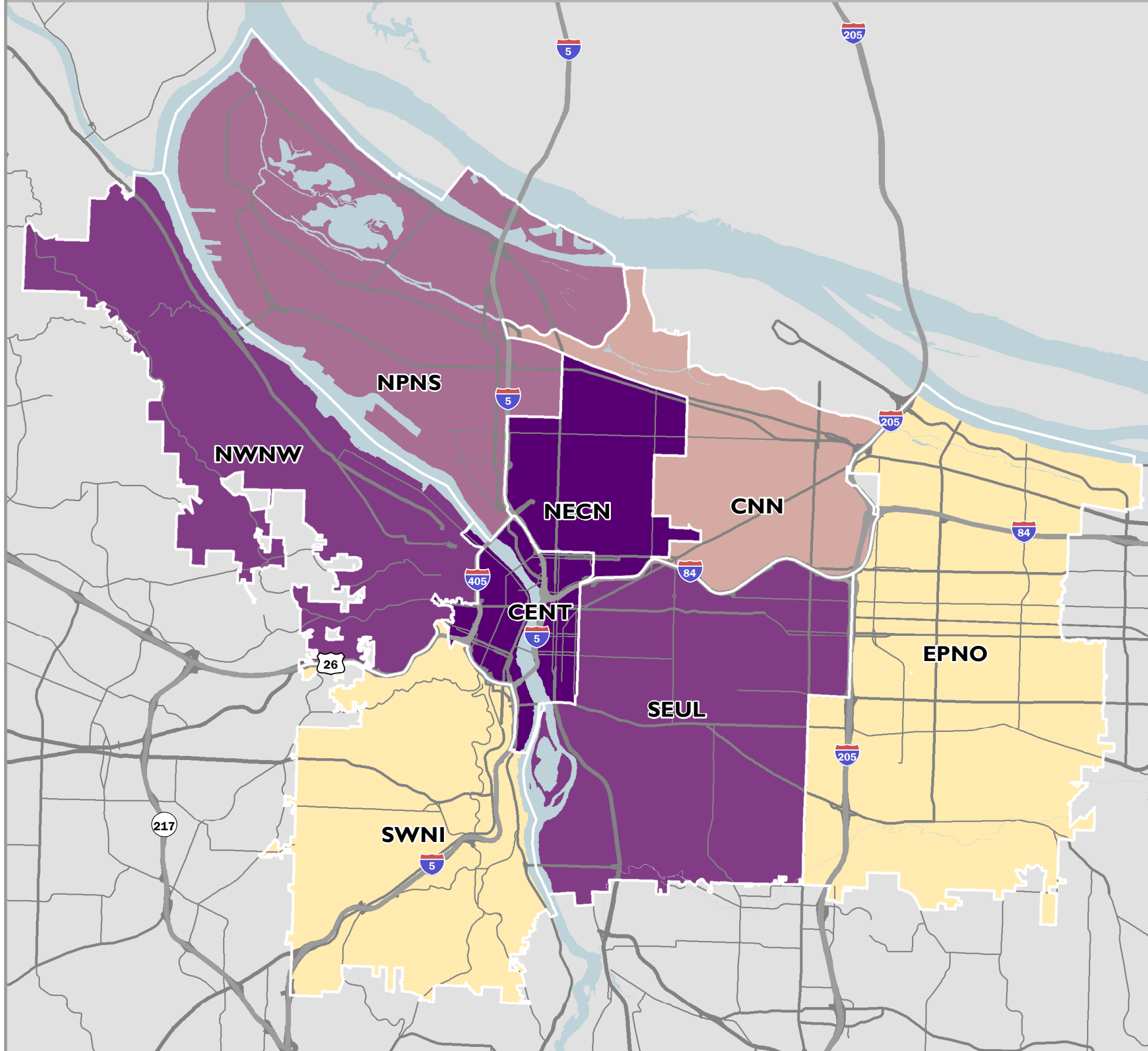


PERCENTAGE OF HOUSEHOLDS WITHIN HEALTHY, CONNECTED NEIGHBORHOODS

The 2012 Portland Plan set citywide goals for the number of households in complete neighborhoods (80% of total households within a complete neighborhood by 2035). This goal encompasses expanding access to active transportation options, recreation opportunities, and commercial services that enable people to meet their needs locally. Creating more complete neighborhoods throughout the city is a key direction to increase health outcomes, reduce automobile trips and carbon emissions, and expand access to goods and services.

The map shows the total number of households that live within a complete neighborhood, as a percentage of all households.

The completeness index is calculated based on the relative proximity (1/4-mile to 1 mile) to the following features: food access (grocery stores, independent markets, farmer's markets and community gardens); recreation access (parks, community centers and natural areas); transit access (light rail, frequent, and standard service); bike connectivity (trails, neighborhood greenways, bike lanes, and local streets); commercial services access (i.e. banks, neighborhood-serving retail, etc.); street and sidewalk connectivity; and elementary school proximity. Areas within the Inner Neighborhoods benefit from high levels of transit service, vibrant neighborhood business districts, street connectivity, and a range of developed parks. The Eastern and Western neighborhoods generally lack transportation infrastructure and community services, but there are pockets that score high enough to be considered "complete".

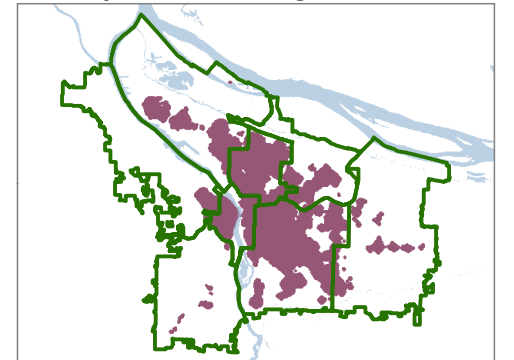

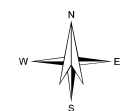
