This ordinance, in accordance with City Code (Chapter 3.21.070 Powers and Duties of IPR), authorizes the Auditor's Office to hire an external consultant to review closed investigations of officerinvolved shooting (OIS) and in-custody deaths (ICD). Currently there are 11 shooting investigations that are either closed or soon-tobe-closed that will require independent review; the scope of work under this contract includes any future OIS/ICD incidents that are closed prior to 12/31/2017. The Independent Police Review (IPR) budget includes \$40,000 in FY 2016-17 for this contract. Per IPR, FY 2016-17 contract costs will be managed within this allocation.

No direct fiscal impact anticipated.

Approve amended application under the Multiple-Unit Limited Tax Exemption Program for 17th and Pettygrove located at 1331 NW 17th Ave (Second Reading Agenda 1217)

CBO: Analysis Total cost to the City of this exemption is in the form of foregone revenue and is estimated at \$1,472,780 over ten years. This is roughly \$400,000 greater than a previously approved Ordinance for the project, due to increases in project size. PHB will receive \$8,000 in fees to administer and monitor the exemption. Adds 17 additional affordable units due to increased project size, but all units are now restricted to 80% MFI rather than the previously-approved 60% MFI.

Amend Title 33, Planning and Zoning to reduce regulatory restrictions and processes for short-term housing and mass shelters (Second Reading 1223; amend Title 33)

CBO Analysis: No significant long-term fiscal impact anticipated. There may be some minimal short-term impacts related to training and reviews. These proposed changes affect a small number of projects, with generally less than five conditional use reviews required in a given calendar year.

1254 Make administrative changes to Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Code for more efficient implementation of the Street Repair and Traffic Safety Program

CBO Analysis: The changes are not expected to have an impact on the end payer of the tax, the timing of the tax, or the amount of revenue raised from the tax. Payers of the Oregon weight-mile tax are exempt from paying the ten-cents per gallon tax, and this legislation is expected make the exemption process more efficient. Currently, Oregon weight-mile tax holders first have to pay the tax and then apply for a refund. With these legislative changes, Oregon Weight-Mile tax payers will never have to pay the tax. These road users, instead pay for their share of road damage through the Heavy Vehicle Use Tax, a separate temporary tax which will be administered through the City's Revenue Division. As ODOT implements its software system for tax collections, PBOT anticipates a small additional charge to set up the system to accommodate this change. This charge is expected to be a one-time charge of around \$50,000. The total administrative collection charges are still expected to remain under 3% of the revenue collected. This is consistent with the original estimate for administrative costs.
