PBOT has previously contributed \$2,000,000 under a prior intergovernmental agreement (IGA), therefore this authorization would be for the remaining \$15,730,000. This project is fully funded by system development charges (SDCs) and is budgeted in PBOT's FY 2018-19 budget through an IGA with TriMet. The bureau will make any necessary adjustments to this IGA during the coming Fall Budget Monitoring Process (BMP).

823 Authorize Cooperative Agreement with Portland General Electric and Portland State University to develop the PREPHub Pilot Project to prepare for an emergency or natural disaster, in an amount not to exceed \$90,000.

CBO Analysis:

Total project cost is \$360,000. Project partners include Portland General Electric (PGE) and Portland State University (PSU). PGE is contributing \$150,000 and PSU \$120,000 for this project. The Bureau of Emergency Management (PBEM) is contributing \$90,000. PBEM's FY 2018-19 budget includes \$80,000 for this project and the bureau will submit a Fall Budget Monitoring Process (BMP) request to reallocate \$10,000 from it's Basic Earthquake Emergency Communication Node (BEECN) program for this pilot project.

The existing BEECNs have experienced vandalism and theft across it's 49 locations in Portland. PBEM's intent with this pilot project is to test the PREPHub's ability to be an effective partner to the BEECN program by storing the BEECN caches inside the installations – preventing vandalism and theft. Should this pilot prove successful, there may be additional future costs as the agreement indicates that up to two additional PREPHub installations may occur, with an initial cost of \$720,000 (using this Cooperative Agreement as an example of costs) plus unknown ongoing maintenance costs, and possibly expanding these to some or all of the existing 49 BEECN locations or other locations. At \$360,000 per installation, an expansion to all 49 locations would cost roughly \$17,640,000 plus unknown ongoing maintenance costs.

843 Accept status report on the progress towards the actions and items listed in the Division Transit Project Locally Preferred Alternative Conditions of Approval.

CBO Analysis:

No immediate fiscal impact. However, there may be future costs associated with this action. The Division Transit Project Locally Preferred Alternative Conditions of Approval Status Report lists future actions that participating bureaus may identify as requiring additional funding. This may lead to future budget requests.

In passing this resolution, City Council would be directing Prosper Portland to submit a request in the FY 2018-19 Fall Budget Monitoring Process (BMP) to fund the "Division Street Business and Community Support" action and other activities. CBO notes that the City Council has chosen not to fund this Prosper Portland request each of the last three years.
