Prosper Portland is pleased to submit its Fall Budget Monitoring (BMP) report. Included in this report is a request for \$252,000 as a contract true up from prior fiscal years, \$157,439 in carry over from FY 2017-18 and \$361,500 in new funding requests. The total Fall BMP request is \$770,939. Also included in this report are updates on the status of current year General Fund decision packages and prior year performance metrics.

 Request for staffing and overhead support based on the amount of time staff is projected to spend on developing and administering the Cannabis Tax grant funds.

• Division Bus Rapid Transit: \$185,000

- o Funding will be used to implement the economic and community development initiatives articulated in the Division Transit and Development Local Action Plan. The goal of which is to assist businesses and residents in preparing for a stronger economic climate and potential adverse impacts or displacement that may result due to the transit investment. Business owners, community organizations and residents have expressed concern that the investment and construction impacts will accelerate displacement, highlighting a greater need for business mitigation and community support.
- City funds will support community outreach, business support and development, an on-the-ground community development team, who will work collaboratively with Prosper Portland, TriMet and PBOT.
- The outer Division corridor is one of the most diverse areas in the city of Portland. This support will address needs of the current residents and businesses; particularly communities of color, immigrants and low-income populations, so they will benefit from the future transit improvements and development in their neighborhood.

PCC Swan Island Training Center: \$150,000

Request to partially fund a new employee training center on Swan Island
that will be directed toward bridging the gap between unemployed
Portlanders and the needs of certain manufacturing businesses on Swan
Island. This request is contingent upon Prosper Portland certifying the need
for additional training capacity to the Mayor's Office by 12/31/2018
through monitoring the balance of labor supply and demand of welders in
the Portland market.



Performance Reporting

Attached are updated performance reports for program metrics and Prosper Portland's Key Performance Indicators. As of September 12, 2018, several metrics are still being collected by Prosper Portland partners for FY 2017-18 and will not be available until updated metrics are submitted for the FY 2019-20 Requested Budget.

Key performance metrics for FY 2017-18 improved over FY 2016-17; however, in some cases did not meet targeted numbers.

- Percentage of households at or above self-sufficiency is on target to reach Prosper Portland's goal when applying previous standard (66%). The calculation for this metric changed in 2017, which addresses the large difference between Prosper Portland's target and actual. Still, 66% of households at or above self-sufficiency highlights economic challenges that we are working to impact in Portland.
- Percentage of workforce in Multnomah County earning at least a middle wage has increased from FY 2016-17 (46.6% to 56%). As Portland experiences historic economic growth, the backward-looking economic data has begun to catch up.
- Cumulative percentage of start-up investments to firms founded, owned, or led by women by Prosper Portland backed funds has continued to increase (70% to 77%). Inclusive Startup Fund performance funding for firms founded, owned, or led by women outperformed prior year and the estimate for 2017-18. As the Fund progresses, it is expected to have a larger pipeline of qualified firms to invest in.
- Cumulative percentage of Start-Up investments to firms founded, owned, or led by people of color by Prosper Portland backed funds increased (56% to 69%). Inclusive Startup Fund performance funding for firms founded, owned, or led by people of color outperformed prior year and fell slightly below the estimate for 2017-18. As the Fund progresses, it is expected to have a larger pipeline of qualified firms to invest in.
- Percentage of non-TIF resources for operating budget (staff, materials and services, economic development programs) increased from FY 2016-17. Year-toyear changes based largely on amount of interest earnings are received due to loan repayment schedules and payoffs. This may result in lower interest earnings from the existing portfolio in future years. Overall, future targets depend on implementation of Prosper Portland Long-Term Business Plan, Enterprise Zone activity, and CDBG funding.



• Ratio of Prosper Portland financial assistance to private investment decreased (6.17 to 6.14). Performance of this metric has varied over time based on the type of projects occurring in specific years. This is largely driven by Enterprise Zone activity and timing of projects, as companies in the Enterprise Zone leverage far more private funds than public.
