Adopting the update will not have any immediate budgetary impact. The update adds new projects to the TSP's Unconstrained Major Projects list. Unconstrained Projects are not included in the TSP's financial plan. These projects do have a cost to implement and increase the demand for limited transportation funds available to the City over the next 20 years.

94 Create two new represented classifications of 311 Customer Service Representative I and Representative II and establish interim compensation rates for the classifications

The 311 Program was created as a new program within OMF via Resolution 37456, adopted 11/13/19. The Resolution directed the program's initial staffing and funding structure, which includes the reclassification of the Information & Referral Specialist positions into two new represented classifications: 311 Customer Service Representative I & II. Seven existing Information and Referral staff will be reclassified into the CSR I classification; the additional annual cost of each position is \$5,740.80 will be funded with General Fund discretionary from vacancy savings in Civic Life's FY 2019-20 Adopted Budget. OMF's FY 20-21 Requested Budget includes the additional cost of the both classifications. The \$1.9 million total budget request for the 311 program consists of intergovernmental revenues, General Fund discretionary and overhead, and interagency revenue.

104 Authorize an interfund loan not to exceed \$3,333,500 from the Transportation Operating Fund to the General Fund to provide financing for prepayment of Limited Tax Housing Revenue Bonds, 2005

Series D and amend the FY 2019-20 budget

This Ordinance authorizes an interfund loan not to exceed \$3,333,500 from the Transportation Operating Fund to the General Fund to provide financing for the prepayment of Limited Tax Housing Revenue Bonds, 2005 Series D, amending the Fiscal Year 2019-20 budget accordingly. The Bureau of Transportation has sufficient resources in its Transportation Operating Fund. The loan is to be repaid with interest no later than June 30, 2025. The City expects to call the 2021-2025 maturities of the Bonds upon City Council approval of the legislation. The interfund loan is expected to produce approximately \$200,000 in total debt service savings in the City's General Fund through FY 2024-25. The loan will accrue interest at the City's Investment Fund earnings rate, payable to the Bureau of Transportation's Transportation Operating Fund during the life of the loan, resulting in a neutral economic impact to PBOT.

105 Approve findings to authorize an exemption to the competitive bidding requirements and authorize the use of the alternative contracting method of Construction Manager/General Contractor in connection with the Parklane Park Construction Project for an estimated amount of \$8,500,000

This Ordinance authorizes Parks to use an alternative contracting approach for the Parklane Park development project. The bureau offers a low confidence estimate of \$8.5M in project costs. Authorizing this contract will trigger an estimated operations and maintenance cost of for the project of \$470,000 (low confidence). The bureau notes that it intends to request resources for operations and maintenance of this project in the budget process for FY 2021-22; approval of this project contract creates a de facto obligation to fund these future O&M costs that is currently unbudgeted.

CBO notes that the FY 2019-20 budget note "Operations and Maintenance Funding Sustainability" directs the Portland Parks & Recreation bureau and the City Budget Office to work together to develop, as part of the Parks bureau's financial sustainability plan, a mechanism that allows the bureau to better plan for and transparently communicate the bureau's out-year operations and maintenance needs and provide Council with clearer decision points regarding approval of new parks amenities. The FY 2019-20 Adopted Budget directs completion of this work as part of the Fall Supplemental budget. The Parks bureau and the City Budget Office are currently working to resolve this note, and a proposal is forthcoming.

113 Refer a measure to City voters for the May 19, 2020 election authorizing the extension of a program dedicated to street repair and traffic safety through a temporary, 10 cents per gallon tax on motor vehicle fuels in Portland for vehicles not subject to weight-mile tax and amend City Code 17.105

This legislation refers a measure to City voters to provide a four year continuation of a temporary 10 cent per gallon tax on motor vehicle fuels from light vehicles in Portland. PBOT estimates that the first gas tax, which was approved by voters in 2016, is estimated to bring in \$76 million for vehicles not subject to the weightmile tax. If renewed at the same rate, the measure is estimated to raise \$76 million over four years, beginning January 2021. Administering the gas tax collection is estimated to cost approximately 1% of annual revenues.

Funding will support PBOT's Street Repair and Traffic Repair Program which include, but are not limited to, street repair, Safe Routes to School, sidewalk completion, and high crash corridor safety projects. A complete list of projects funded by the first heavy use and 10 cent motor vehicle tax are discussed in the Fixing Our Streets Progress Report of 2019 (Council Calendar item 112).

114 Establish a Heavy Vehicle Use Tax to fund Portland's Street Repair and Traffic Safety Program

The legislation extends a temporary tax on heavy use vehicles to help fund PBOTs street repair and traffic safety program that began on January 1, 2016 and imposed through the 2019 tax year. If passed by Council, the legislation would increase the tax from 2.8 to 3% of the total Oregon Weight-Mile Tax and extend it for four more tax years: 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023. Business that have a Portland Business License and pay the Oregon weight-mile tax will be assessed the tax.

This legislation is expected to generate \$11 million in total revenue, a 38% increase from the first four years of the Heavy Use Tax which is estimated to bring in \$8 million. Administering the tax collection is estimated to cost approximately 5% of revenues annually. These estimates are medium confidence. If at the end of tax

FEBRUARY 5-6, 2020 year 2021 the City is above or below the four year target by more than 10 percent, the legislation gives the City the authority to adjust the rate to meet the \$11 million target.
