Diversity and Civic Leadership Program Year-end performance summary

FY 2010-11 July 2010 through June 2011

Organization: Urban League of Portland

GOAL: Community Involvement, Increase the number and diversity of people who are involved and volunteer in their communities and neighborhoods.

- 1. Examples of developing culturally appropriate strategies to bring constituency together to build community identity, understanding of existing City governance structures, and/or skills to analyze City power dynamics.
 - Portland Plan, phase III worked with BPS to engage African American community. Assisting BPS staff to develop messaging framework on development of document. Focus on education issues.
 - Race Equity Survey Developing a race equity survey, did door-to-door outreach. Partnered with Bus Project. Goal to ensure input is used by PBS and City to make improvements for underserved and low-income communities.
 - **Health Equity Survey** After race survey developed survey including health access, jobs, transit, and housing.
 - **Door to door outreach** Organized several canvases in outer SE, knocked on 1,100+ doors. Collected 300 surveys from community members, 150 specifically African American. New goal to gather 1000 surveys from African Americans.
 - VOICES, Voices are Important for Community Engagement Quarterly community meetings engaging African Americans in outer SE Portland. Topics people want to work on Portland Plan, legislative issues, health equity. 44 people attended (19 at 1st, 25 at 2nd, 20 at 3rd) Later developing outreach in New Columbia, Leander Court, and Arbor Glen apartment complexes. Working with Rose CDC. Setting up satellite office for ULP at East Portland Neighborhood Office.
 - **Equity TAG** working with BPS and ONI on Portland Plan Equity TAG. Traveled to Seattle to learn about their Race and Social Justice Initiative.
 - Candidate forum 1 gubernatorial and city/county commissioners races, worked with 20 community partners (NAYA, Emmanuel Temple Church). 50 people.
 - Candidate forum 2- Gubernatorial, treasurer, county commissioners, Metro president races. Partnered with African American Alliance, 200 attended.
 - Social Justice and Civic Leadership trainings 3 track series,
 - 1. Evaluate systems of oppression in political and social institutions
 - o 2. Building Movements to Win equity agenda for policy change

- 3. Aspiring to Elected Office helping POC get elected to office. 32 in attendance.
- Youth forum, Get Your Vote On! Partnered with NE Coalition of Neighborhoods, Portland Community College. 50 youth attended.
- **ULP Annual Meeting** 150 in attendance.
- **ULP Policy Makers Roundtable –** On reproductive health. Attended by 60 people including state, county and city officials.
- **Discrimination: Know Your Rights community meeting** partnered with BOLI and the Fair Housing Council. 45 attended.
- City budget process turned out people through email notices.
- Police accountability hearings turned out people through email notices.
- Racial Equity Tool partnering with ONI. To assist public entities to make
 equitable decisions and steps to eliminate disparities related to access
 budgeting, investment, programs and services delivery.
- **GOTV for Nov. 2010 election** Encourage people to vote. 10 volunteers. Called 671 people. Made 59 contacts.
- State legislative task force, training and advocacy 7 volunteers recruited through leadership workshops now involved in state legislative campaigns. Organized advocacy training, 30 attended. Organized community task force to coordinate letter writing, testifying at hearings, and engaging with elected officials. 150 at Legislative Action Day.
- City's State Legislative Agenda Participated in events to help set City's legislative agenda.
- Black Student Unions organized meetings with students at several local high schools. Also working with BPS staff to engage youth on Portland Plan. Engaging students to foster organization and leadership development. BSU mtg. at Jefferson, 15 participated; BSU meeting at Parkrose, 10; BSU meeting at Grant, 30.
- Health equity education and mobilization campaign Related to Portland Plan and transportation issues with Center for Intercultural Organizing, Coalition for a Livable Future, Upstream Health. Also working with Multnomah County Health Department. Focus on reproductive health and other health disparities, community health worker models.
- Office of Equity and Human Rights Advocating for creation of office. Helps to build relationships with City officials, raising awareness of inequities highlighted in State of Black Oregon report and Coalition of Communities of Color report.
- **Urban Harvest Garden** Project in North PDX to engage African American families in urban agriculture. 25 participated in first work day. Advocating for food justice by working with Multnomah Portland Food Policy Council.
- **Wellness Tour** Provided health screening events in 9 locations over 9 days aimed at African American health disparities. Screened 797 people. Produced health cards with health practices, recruitment to join health advocacy campaign.
- P-20 Cradle to Career Education Summit Attended conference, 200 attend.
- Fir Ridge High School tabling Engaging youth and families, 75 attend.

- Employment Task Force meetings Discuss workforce diversity re City of Portland, negotiation of community benefit agreements, project labor agreements. 15 attended.
- **Garden Net Program** Partnering with Central NE Neighbors, build on current garden outreach project to ensure access to healthy, affordable food.
- Comcast Cares Day 45 participants.
- Unnatural Causes film showing at Leander Court. 30 participated.
- Good in the Hood 150 participated.

Culturally appropriate public involvement models

- 10. Please describe any opportunities this quarter you have had to engage with City public involvement efforts. What have been some of the successes or challenges in engaging in this process?
 - City boards and commissions Making progress. Issue to overcome reluctance of people of color to participate in processes without clear outcomes and benefits to the community. Communities of color respond best to public involvement opportunities within their own communities and when they help define the agenda. People representing communities of color are usually singular voices on many city committees. There is currently not the capacity within the City nor the tools to change the nature of decision-making, which makes it a challenge to move beyond participation to actionable measures and outcomes.
 - Outer SE Portland Want to expand organizational capacity where ULP is weak, such as SE Portland. Collaborating with East Portland Neighborhood Office to open satellite office.
 - Public Involvement Advisory Council (PIAC) producing best practices for bureaus and Equipedia.
 - Portland Plan Organizing to ensure community input is reflected in the policies and strategies that emerge through the TAGS, Office of Equity, and City bureaus.
