Governor's Orders

December 3, Update - The "Freeze" announced by the Governor that went into effect Wednesday, November 18th ended December 2nd and then **Portland Area counties entered a new phase termed "extreme risk" on December 3rd with no stated end date.**

Under "extreme risk":

- > Restaurants and Bars - takeout highly recommended, outdoor dining allowed with a max 50 capacity, 11pm close, max 6 per table with 2 households max.
- > Gyms, museums, indoor pools, sports courts and all indoor recreational facilities closed.
- > Outdoor recreational/entertainment facilities max capacity 50 - zoos, gardens, pools, and other outdoor entertainment venues.
- > Outdoor visitations only to long-term care facilities.
- > Indoor gathering limited to 6, recommended limit of 2 households.
- > Churches/faith-based gatherings limited to 25% capacity or 100 total, 150 outdoor
- > Retailers limit capacity to 50%, encourage curbside pick-up
- > No changes to hair salons, physical therapy safety protocols or childcare or school guidelines.

Travel Restrictions effective 11/14/20 - Oregon, California and Washington issue joint travel advisory. No expiration date at this time.

1. Persons arriving in Oregon from other states or countries, including returning Oregon residents, should practice self-quarantine for 14 days after arrival. These persons should limit their interactions to their immediate household. This recommendation does not apply to individuals who cross state or country borders for essential travel. Non-essential travel includes travel that is considered tourism or recreational in nature. Essential travel includes: work and study, critical infrastructure support, economic services and supply chains, health, immediate medical care, and safety and security.

2. Oregonians are encouraged to stay home or in their region and avoid non-essential travel to other states or countries. Avoiding travel can reduce the risk of virus transmission and bringing the virus back to Oregon.

As of October 19, 2020 - Wearing a mask required at all indoor public spaces including private and public workplaces, outdoor markets and schools unless someone is alone in an office or private workspace.

Historic Info Regarding Governor's Orders/Guidelines

March 11, 2020 emergency declaration to last at least a month - all schools in State closed as of 3-16-20. Childcare Centers allowed to remain open.

March 16, 2020 order signed banning all statewide events of more than 25 people and limiting restaurants and bars to takeout and delivery only - Executive Order 20-07 defines this restriction in detail (https://www.oregon.gov/gov/Documents/executive_orders/eo_20-07.pdf)
Local enforcement by Multnomah County Environmental Health: 503-988-3400 x1. Nursing Homes no longer allowed visitors. March 17th school closures extended indefinitely. Ordered postponement of non-urgent health care procedures.

March 22, 2020- Executive Order 20-11 - 90-day moratorium on residential evictions for nonpayment of rent. On June 26th the moratorium was extended through September 30th and several times subsequently through June 30, 2021.

March 23, 2020 – Executive Order 20-12 “Stay Home, Save Lives”

To the maximum extent possible, individuals should stay at home. Non-essential social and recreational gatherings of individuals outside of a residence are prohibited regardless of size. When individuals need to leave home they should at all times maintain social distancing of at least 6 feet including outdoor recreational activities. Individuals may not patronize businesses prohibited from operating.

Businesses prohibited from operation because close personal contact is difficult or impossible to avoid include – shopping malls, gyms, barber shops, nail salons, bowling alleys, senior centers, theaters, amusement parks, etc. (see the Executive Order page 4 for a much more detailed list)

For all other businesses they must establish, implement and enforce social distancing policies and facilitate telework as much as possible.

Childcare facilities may remain open but must limit participants to a stable group of 10 or fewer children.

All campgrounds are closed, all State Parks are closed, local Portland Parks are still open but all playground equipment areas, outdoor sports courts, skate parks and pools are closed.

Other violations of the order will be enforced by police. PPB will follow an education-first approach where officers will attempt to educate violators of the order first. If community members do not adhere to the officer’s direction, they are subject to criminal citations for interfering with a Police Officer as well as executive order-ORS 401.99, both misdemeanor crimes. Businesses out of compliance will be provided a warning and opportunity to get in compliance. Officers will write a report and send to any appropriate licensing agency. To report violations - call **503-823-3333**. **FAQ from Portland Police regarding enforcement** - <https://www.portlandoregon.gov/police/article/757705> It is NOT necessary for individuals to have special paperwork documentation from an employer indicating employee is essential. There are no travel restrictions. Law enforcement will not be pulling individuals over for any possible violations of the Stay Home order.

April 1, 2020 - Executive Order 20-13 - Governor placed a 90-day moratorium on commercial evictions for nonpayment. Executive Order 20-13 - https://www.oregon.gov/gov/admin/Pages/eo_20-13.aspx

April 14, 2020 - Governor holds press conference to announce Western States Pact and Framework for Reopening Oregon.

April 23, 2020 - Oregon Legislature Emergency Board approved \$32 million funding package - \$12 million rent assistance/motel vouchers, \$10 million small business assistance for those that have not received CARES Act assistance, \$2 million emergency housing for DV survivors, \$10 million assistance for unemployed workers not eligible for UI due to immigration status, \$3.35 million for long-term care facility testing and training.

May 1, 2020 - Governor lifts ban on non-essential surgical procedures. State of Emergency extended to July 6th. Reopening guidelines include sufficient testing and ability to do contact tracing - <https://sharedsystems.dhsoha.state.or.us/DHSForms/Served/le2347.pdf>

May 7, 2020 - Reopening Oregon State Guidance Info – First State order allowing reopening according to County specific guidelines so some counties were deemed eligible by the State to begin reopening May 15th and for others it was later. As of May 22nd, all but Washington and Multnomah counties approved for phase 1, Clackamas County approved May 23rd, Washington County June 1st, and Multnomah County June 19th.

PHASE 1 (guidance from the May 7, 2020 reopening)

Outdoor Recreation - Must implement social distancing mandates, encourage face coverings, keep restrooms clean, ban all group gatherings or 10+, keep playgrounds, pools, sports courts and picnic shelters closed.

Food and Drink Establishments - required to space customers by at least six feet, limit groups to parties of 10 or fewer, and end on-site consumption of food and drink by 10 p.m. Employees will be required to wear masks. Self-service operations including buffets, salad bars, soda machines and growler refilling stations are prohibited. Businesses unable to operate under those restrictions will be limited to takeout and delivery. Video Lottery allowed with distancing and cleaning restrictions.

Personal Service Providers (hair and nail salons, massage therapists and tattoo parlors, etc.) - ask customers COVID-19 screening questions before appointments, record client information, provide masks for employees and customers, maintain six feet of distance between clients, and keep customers outside while they wait.

Retail Stores - Standalone furniture stores, art galleries, jewelry shops and boutiques will be allowed to reopen if they can adhere to physical distancing guidelines statewide on

May 15th. Other retail stores (including malls and businesses within them) could reopen as soon as May 15 if their counties are approved to reopen by the governor's office. Retailers must limit the number of customers, mandate employee masks, and frequently clean high-traffic areas.

Fitness Related Businesses (gyms, martial arts centers, etc.) - Limit the number of individuals in the facility and focus on maintaining at least six (6) feet of physical distance between people. No contact sports.

PHASE 2

On June 5th several Oregon Counties move to a Phase 2 reopening which includes expansion of in-person gatherings to up to 50 people, theaters and churches with a maximum capacity of 250, expanding restaurant and bar closing times to midnight, pools, spas and sports courts allowed to reopen with restrictions, bowling and mini-golf facilities reopening.

June 19, 2020 - Governor declared that Washington, Clackamas and Multnomah County would be treated the same for future reopening plans.

June 26, 2020 - State bills passed extending residential and commercial eviction moratorium through September 30th as well as lender foreclosures.

July 1, 2020 - Statewide requirement to wear face coverings while in indoor public spaces, such as grocery stores and other businesses.

July 13, 2020 - Order required face coverings outdoors if can't maintain distance of 6 feet and indoor gatherings limited to 10.

July 24, 2020 - Face coverings required for children 5 and up and limits indoor venues such as gyms and houses of worship to 100 people. Restaurants/Bars must close by 10pm.

August 20, 2020 - Face coverings must be worn in office settings.

Sept 1, 2020 - State extends foreclosure moratorium through 12/31/20

Sept 29, 2020 - State extends residential eviction moratorium through 12/31/20

October 19, 2020 - Wearing a mask required at all indoor public spaces including private and public workplaces, outdoor markets and schools unless someone is alone in an office or private workspace.
