Recommendation (Support for Multnomah County Resource Center)○ Race, Ethnicity, and Other (REO): Held a Community Discussion on Gun Violence in Portland on October 3rd from 5-8p at Highland Christian Church. Will schedule a debrief with the Gun Violence Reduction Team (GVRT). - [The Compliance Officer and Community Liaison \(COCL\) presented on the Draft Compliance and Outcome Assessment Quarterly Report: All Sections with Remaining Compliance Issues and 2019 Updates](#)
- PCCEP Comments:
 - Appreciate the comparisons between Portland and other National cities
 - Outcomes vs. Outputs of the compliance report
 - Concerns with the wording used in paragraphs 89 and 90
 - Concerns with the data presented around training
 - Too soon to say the report is in substantial compliance
- Public Comments:
 - Concerns on the communication strategies to reach the whole Portland community when conducting the survey
 - The COCL should be looking at Police Bureaus around the world and not just nationwide for leading examples
 - Give the homeless / mental ill community a space and area to live
 - The surveys should be printed and placed inside of local community organizations instead of being sent by mail
- COCL Response:
 - The COCL is not just checking boxes. The report has been an on-going effort over the last five years
 - The hope is that the Portland Police Bureau trainings will produce better results around community engagement
 - The outcomes of the report were not the main focus of the agreement, the process of the compliance is part of the Settlement Agreement
 - It's too soon to expect the outcomes of the compliance

- PCCEP Comments:
 - Would like further information on the systemic compliance behind the COCL report
 - With no data it's too early to tell if the City is within substantial compliance
 - We as a community have to make difficult choices on public need priorities
 - Concern with who is responsible for Item 89 the city or the Community Center Organizations (CCO's).
 - Where does PCCEP stand with the funding on Item 89. More research is needed behind who are the responsible parties for funding walk-in centers.
