Discussion points / Trends

The discrepancy between number of FDCR's written and the total in Precinct/Division/Location of Occurrence has been tracked to 3 FDCR's that did not have the Precinct / Division box entered.

During the 1st quarter of 2013, four 940 Review reports were referred to Internal Affairs by precinct command or the Inspector for investigation or additional intake. One 940 Review was forwarded as an Internal Service Improvement Opportunity after an out of policy finding, by precinct command, of a minor rule violation.

940 Review reports continue to be well thought out and well written. However, a trend is appearing in some FDCR's in which important information is left blank (mental health box etc) and improper phrases or verbiage and generally poor grammar are used in the narrative. Based on narrative information provided, the Mental Health Issues category should be at least 10 incidents higher. These reports are

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being approved by sergeants without correction.

The Operations Branch Adjutant and I have documented several instances of a 940 report narrative not matching the information provided in the officers reports. This is rare, and the incidents have been addressed, but there is an indication that those reviews may have been written based on an officers briefing without complete review of the police reports.

Takedowns and Hands/Feet incidents have increased as Taser applications have declined.

Pointing of Firearm dropped significantly in March, 2013. However, on average it far exceeds any other force option.

Pepper Spray deployments remain low.

Bean Bag deployments and Baton usage are exceptionally low.

Demographically, force against white males and black males remain in the lead with force against white males exceeding that of black males by 17% for the quarter.

For clarification purposes, the pointing of firearm category indicates the number of incidents reported on the FDCR's. The Person who has a Pointing of Firearm category indicates total people, such as multiple occupants of a vehicle in a high-risk traffic stop.
