

# LLOYD TO WOODLAWN NEIGHBORHOOD GREENWAY

The Lloyd to Woodlawn Neighborhood Greenway Project will expand our citywide low-stress bicycling network in Northeast Portland by creating a safe and pleasant place to walk or bike to employment centers, neighborhood destinations, schools, and nearby parks.

The project will recommend changes to local streets to reduce cut-through car traffic, address high speeds, and enhance major street crossings. These changes will greatly improve the conditions for people that walk and bicycle in the area.

## PROJECT OBJECTIVE

- **Design a safe and comfortable route** for walking and bicycling to important destinations through NE Portland.
- **Improve safety and visibility** at intersections and crossings to reduce conflicts.
- **Reduce negative impacts of cut-through traffic** on neighborhood local streets by maintaining safe and appropriate motor vehicle speeds and volumes.
- **Reduce the impact of traffic pattern changes** on adjacent arterial streets.

## PROJECT BENEFITS

- Supports Vision Zero with a safe option to access MLK Jr Blvd.
- Enhances neighborhood livability.
- Supports Safe Routes to School (SRTS).
- Enhances access to Irving Park.
- Opportunity for community placemaking.

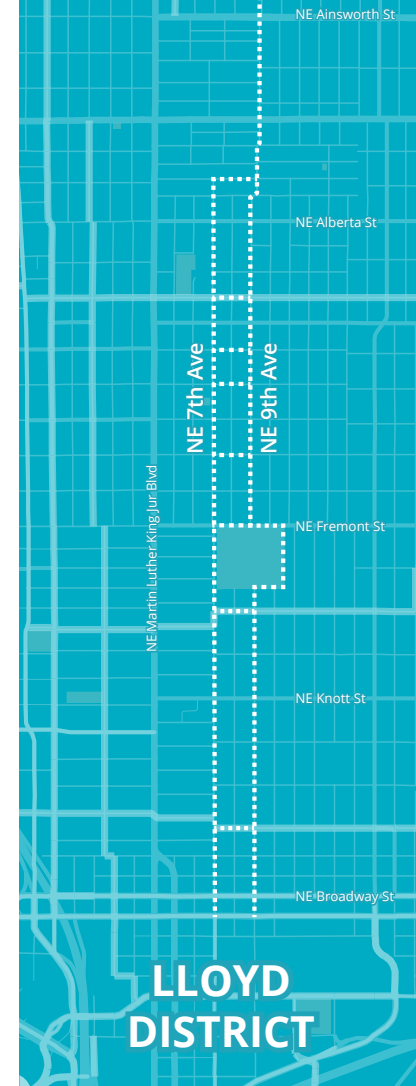
## FUNDING
