City Commissioner Chloe Eudaly is an activist, writer, and former small business owner who took her seat on City Council in January of 2017. She has served as the Commissioner-in-Charge of the Portland Bureau of Transportation since September of 2018. During her tenure overseeing PBOT, Commissioner Eudaly has worked on a wide variety of projects including passing the Central City in Motion plan, improving and approving the second Shared Electric Scooter Pilot Program, and making Adaptive BIKETOWN permanent. Commissioner Eudaly's priorities as Transportation Commissioner are safety, equity, and sustainability: she knows that safe and accessible streets for cyclists are vital for the future of transportation in Portland, and she looks forward to realizing her vision with a broad coalition of community partners.

Northwest in Motion (NWIM)

The Northwest in Motion Plan has been underway for the past year working with the community to identify and prioritize projects to improve walking, biking, and transit use in inner NW Portland. PBOT has developed design concepts for twelve top-tier projects and is seeking feedback to ensure this plan is on the right track. Southwest in Motion (SWIM)

Nick Falbo, also in PBOT's planning group, is managing this project and will provide a presentation. Southwest In Motion is a short-term prioritization, refinement, and implementation strategy for planned active transportation investments in Southwest Portland. The final plan will identify a realistic short-term action plan that provides basic walking and bicycling connectivity where they are needed most. The draft plan identifies priority short term walking and biking projects, such as bike lanes, sidewalks, shoulders, and neighborhood greenways. It also includes a discussion of other potential road safety enhancements, including advisory shoulders and traffic calming.
