

Major Changes to PCCEP Proposal (since 8/3/17 Council Hearing)

General/Mission

- Rename to Portland **Committee** on Community-Engaged Policing in order to comply with rules for boards and commissions in the City of Portland
- Include language “independent assessment of the Settlement Agreement” through the tools outlined in Plan

Scope of Work

- Extend to PCCEP the right to make an appearance before Judge Simon at annual status conference (similar to COAB).
- PCCEP review of PPB policies touching on key areas of concern, in addition to DOJ policies.
 - Integration of PCCEP into PPB policy review process
 - PPB Policy Team to meet with PCCEP during a directive’s universal review period for feedback and recommendations. PCCEP to then share information about the directive, and its recommendations, with the public in order to solicit the public’s feedback and recommendations, which will then be shared with PPB.
 - PCCEP, with Mayor approval and Council consultation, authorized to flag directives for review with written explanation for the request. *NOTE: Directives are generally scheduled for review every two years. The City recognizes that the community has an interest in a number of directives, and particularly those that are relevant to current events (e.g., Directive 635.10. Crowd Management, with respect to demonstrations; Directive 810.10, Arrest of Foreign Nationals with respect to Portland’s status as a Sanctuary City). This authority is intended to allow PCCEP to be responsive to community concerns when there is a compelling interest to review and revise a Bureau practice.*

Selection

- Mayor, in consultation with other Council offices, to work with community selection panel to develop selection criteria and public outreach strategies for the PCCEP selection process.
- Community selection panel to increase from three to **five** diverse members, each selected by a commissioner.

Term

- Volunteers will serve two year maximum terms. During the first year of PCCEP's life, there will be staggered terms with a certain number of volunteers serving for a full term, and the remainder serving only one year. Those who are appointed to serve one year terms will have the option of re-applying to serve a full term.
 - Volunteers will have the option of indicating whether they would like to serve one or two year terms during the application process.
 - Purpose of staggered terms: retention of institutional memory over time. Otherwise, every two years, PCCEP (and its work, by extension) would suffer under the complete turnover of its members.

City's Responsibilities

- Mental health advocates to be included in training on Settlement Agreement (in addition to AMAC)
- The City will contract the services of an organizational development consultant, relying on their expertise in organizational at the transformation to establish the PCCEP and training for PCCEP
- Mayor/Police Commissioner or a delegate, and the PPB Chief or a delegate, will strive to attend all public PCCEP meetings. Other Council offices are encouraged to attend.
- After the PPB develops the Community Engagement Plan, the Plan will be considered by the City Council in a public hearing, leading to Council's adoption of the Plan after review and amendments if indicated. (Also under Section IX, Deliverable Product)

Members' Responsibilities

- One of PCCEP's twice monthly meetings must be open to the public.
- PCCEP now **required** to coordinate with COCL for town hall presentations on COCL's quarterly reports and compliance assessments.

Deliverable Product

- In developing its recommendations for PPB's Community Engagement Plan, PCCEP will spend the first year gathering information from the public and compiling recommendations. Recommendations must be submitted to PPB within **one year** of being seated.
 - Note: Given the breadth of the committee's work, it is important that the City set realistic deadlines for volunteers so that they are able to do their best work on behalf of Portlanders.
